

Regular Ketchikan City Council meeting was called to order by Mayor Williams at 7:00 p.m., May 6, 2010, with the following members present: Dick Coose, Jason Harris, Kj Harris, Matthew Olsen, Jack Shay, Robert Sivertsen and Marty West.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given by all persons in the Chambers.

Staff present were Manager Amylon, Assistant Manager Martin, Finance Director Newell, Acting Fire Chief Breitreitz, Police Chief Talik, Public Works Director Allen, Electric Division Manager Kline and City Clerk Suiter.

COMMUNICATIONS

In the packet there was a letter from Brien Salazar of Venture Travel regarding the possibility of a bridge to Gravina Island located near their property on Tongass Avenue.

Mayor Williams noted several items laid on the table, including: additional information for the item regarding the city attorney's state licensing; a notification the manager will be allowing the use of Third Avenue bypass due to construction; a memorandum relating to the possible protest of the transfer of liquor license to Ketchikan Fish Market Crab Cracker Seafood Bar; a report of the May 5, 2010 power outages; a report of reservoir elevations and a missing page from the Cooperative Relations Committee unapproved minutes.

PERSONS TO BE HEARD

Robert Boyle addressed the Council, thanking the City for the cooperative relations with the School District. He related circumstances dealing with signs and paintings around the schools for safety concerns. He provided a story regarding parking bumps for parking lots.

Dee Walker spoke regarding his request for a liquor license transfer. He emphasized they are buying the license and the business has been inspected by all, from the liquor board down to the fire marshal. He stated they have been in the community for 14 years and their staff is totally professional. He said he is available for questions.

Christopher Boyette spoke against the transfer of the liquor license on behalf of his client, Wines International d/b/a Fat Stan's. He cited reasons, including the concentration of licenses in the same area, the proximity of another license, the objections of Wines International, and possible conduct of a business open in the summer of its temporary employees. In response to Councilmember Jason Harris, he clarified there were major concerns the Council should be addressing, not that the business is violating any codes. He answered additional questions from the Council.

In response to Councilmember Kj Harris, Clerk Suiter explained the time line in which the Council must make a decision on the license transfer request, noting there is a response required by May 14th or else the license is automatically approved.

Terry Wanzer, President of Historic Ketchikan, Inc., asked the Council to fund them for the full amount they have received in past years. He cited their mantra, economic development through historic preservation, is something to which they can attest success. He related several projects they are or have been involved in. He stated they have not received funding from the Borough, but may on a case by case basis, if they identify programs or work in the future they can assist with. He pointed out they have never asked for an increase in their funding. He answered questions from the Council.

CONSENT AGENDA

Councilmember Jason Harris requested several items be moved from New Business to the Consent Agenda, including: a Memorandum of Understanding for equipment purchase and training for the Ketchikan Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response Team between the City of Ketchikan and the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation; a request from the American Legion to install an upright monument in the Bayview Cemetery; an award of bid for the replacement of three Police Department vehicles to Karlson Motors, Inc.; Resolution No. 10-2330 authorizing the submission of a grant application for the Ketchikan General Hospital Additions and Alterations Project and entrance into a contract with NAC Architecture for design services; and an award for cellular telephone services and equipment to AT&T, Inc. Mayor Williams asked if there were any objections, and none were expressed.

Councilmember Kj Harris requested the item regarding the liquor license transfer be considered separately.

Approval of Minutes

Moved by Jason Harris, seconded by Coose approval of the minutes of the regular meeting of April 15, 2010.

Motion passed with Kj Harris, Coose, Sivertsen, West, Shay, Olsen and Jason Harris voting yea.

Memorandum of Understanding Between the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation and the City of Ketchikan – Equipment Purchases and Training for the Ketchikan Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response Team

Moved by Jason Harris, seconded by Coose the City Council approve the Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Ketchikan and the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation in the amount of \$8,500 for the purpose of equipment purchases and training to the Ketchikan Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response Team and authorize the city manager to execute the Memorandum of Understanding on behalf of the City Council.

Award of Contract No. 10-10 – Replacement of Three Police Vehicles to Karlson Motors, Inc. - \$127,700

Moved by Jason Harris, seconded by Coose the City Council approve award of Contract No. 10-10 Police Vehicles to Karlson Motors, Inc. of Ketchikan, Alaska in the amount of \$127,700; authorize a budget transfer in the amount of \$10,700 from Appropriated Reserves of the Public Works Sales Tax Fund to the 2010 Ketchikan Police Department Vehicle Replacement Capital Account; authorize funding in the amount of \$127,700 from the 2010 Ketchikan Police Department Vehicles Replacement Capital Account; and direct the manager to execute the contract on its behalf.

Award of Contract No. 10-13, Cellular Telephone Service and Equipment – AT&T, Inc.

Moved by Jason Harris, seconded by Coose the City Council award Contract No. 10-13, Agreement for Cellular Telephone Service and Equipment, to AT&T, Inc. and authorize the city manager to execute a two-year contract with an option to renew for two additional years on behalf of the City Council.

Motion passed with Kj Harris, Coose, Sivertsen, West, Shay, Olsen and Jason Harris voting yea.

Box 23537, Ketchikan, Alaska 99901, physical location: 5 Salmon Landing Market #110, from: Thai House Restaurant, Kwok Keung Wu, 127 Stedman Street, Ketchikan, Alaska 99901.

Motion passed with West, Olsen, Jason Harris, Sivertsen and Coose voting yea; Shay and Kj Harris voting nay.

Motion passed with Sivertsen, Jason Harris, Coose, Kj Harris, Olsen, West and Shay voting yea.

NEW BUSINESS

Resolution No. 10-2329 – Rescinding Resolution No. 10-2318 and Canceling the June 22, 2010 Special Election Authorized by That Resolution

Moved by Shay, seconded by Sivertsen the City Council approve Resolution No. 10-2329 rescinding Resolution No. 10-2318 and canceling the June 22, 2010 special election authorized by that resolution; and establishing an effective date.

Motion passed with Coose, Jason Harris, West, Kj Harris, Sivertsen, Olsen and Shay voting yea.

Handicapped Parking Enforcement – Mayor Williams

Mayor Williams stated a few years ago a citizen was authorized to issue handicapped parking citations because there were a lot of infractions. He said this person is not interested in doing it again, and he hoped someone else may be interested.

Manager Amylon said if there is a concern, he can put out a directive to the Police Department to pay particular attention to this issue. He informed in the last 12 months 42 citations have been issued for illegal parking in handicapped zones. He stated there have been problems using someone outside the Police Department due to not being readily accepted by the public at large since the person is not a police or parking enforcement officer. He recommended the Council allow him to work with Police Chief Talik to step up enforcement on the issue, and if it is not successful it can be revisited.

Councilmember Kj Harris suggested doubling the fines for parking in handicapped zones.

Third Avenue Bypass Driveway/Access Requests

Moved by Sivertsen, seconded by Jason Harris the City Council direct staff to respond to persons requesting private driveway access letting onto the Third Avenue Bypass with such conditions as would safely allow for use of the driveway access.

Councilmember West commented she assumed it would allow staff to deny the permits if the requestor is not able to come up with the conditions that would allow for safe driveway access. She emphasized it is subject to conditions.

Manager Amylon said if the motion passes it will be a difficult litmus test in terms of proving such access points. He said decisions will be made by his office with input from

Public Works, Police and Fire. He continued his concern is more that the nature of the bypass was to be a bypass, and if we start opening up a higher-posted speed area than the rest of the City he felt drivers in general will not be expecting vehicles to be pulling out onto the road.

Manager Amylon continued that if a permit or driveway is approved, the property owner would be responsible for curb cuts and other costs involved. He emphasized once the curb cut is put in, they may argue that the City is responsible in terms of the future.

Motion passed with Olsen, West, Jason Harris, Sivertsen and Coose voting yea; Shay and Kj Harris voting nay.

**Ketchikan Area Arts and Humanities Council and
Historic Ketchikan Funding – Mayor Williams**

Mayor Williams stated he was contacted by both KAAHC and Historic Ketchikan once we got notice of the refund from SEAPA for \$395,000. He said he talked to some councilmembers to see if there was some interest in putting it on the agenda, and he had received some positive response.

He continued the Council reduced Historic Ketchikan from \$40,000 to \$20,000, and KAAHC from \$63,000 to \$31,600. He brought the issue forward to see if anyone wanted to make a motion to restore the funding.

Moved by West, seconded by Shay to increase the funding to Historic Ketchikan to the originally requested \$40,000 and the Ketchikan Area Arts and Humanities to the originally requested \$63,000.

Councilmember Kj Harris reminded the Council retained some employees scheduled for layoff during budget deliberations, at a cost of roughly \$400,000 to \$500,000. He continued now that SEAPA money comes in it would cover that amount since we didn't lay them off. He felt it seems like robbing Peter to pay Paul to provide additional money to the agencies.

Councilmember Olsen said he agreed with Councilmembers West and Shay on their sentiments, but he had requested this whole issue be taken to the Borough to discuss together and we haven't done that yet. He said he is not in favor of giving them any extra funding until we've had those discussions so we can come up with a funding mechanism.

In response to Councilmember Jason Harris, Manager Amylon said when the Council restored those positions at KPU, the money came out of reserves. He stated he understood the desire to do something for these agencies, but he pointed out the Council just rescinded an election hoping the governor is not going to exercise his veto authority. He explained if both Bethe and Whitman and a couple other projects should become subject

to veto, the Council will be back to take to the voters roughly \$28 million worth of revenue bonds.

Councilmember Jason Harris said the programs are vital to the community, but he is having a difficult time – as he had at budget time – with the money is coming out of reserves. He felt there is only so much in the pot before the pot is empty. He stated there were many hours and many arguments around the table about the budget, and there was a decision made then that he will not change at this point in time.

Manager Amylon suggested either at the meeting of May 20th or the first meeting in June, staff will be presenting the 2009 CAFR to the Council and at the time staff can identify exactly where reserves are. He felt the Council may want to consider postponing this until we can see the City's financial position as compared to what it was projected at budget time.

Councilmember Coose reminded the money from SEAPA is not in our pocket yet, and probably won't be until maybe close to the end of our fiscal year. He pointed out while it has been approved, it is contingent upon some things happening. He further commented the Council took a hard step to cut some money off some agencies that do good things for the community, and we also cut some employees. He said when it is taken out of KPU, ratepayers pay for it. He stated he is not willing to back off on the decision the Council made at budget time.

Councilmember Shay said he is encouraged there is an opportunity to take the issue before the joint meeting next week, and Manager Amylon said since it is not on the agenda it will need to be put on a subsequent agenda. Councilmember Shay continued there have been serious discussions during budget deliberations about persons living outside the City limits contributing to the organizations.

Moved by Shay, seconded by West the subject be deferred to the last regular Council meeting in June.

Motion to defer passed with Jason Harris, Sivertsen, Shay, Coose, Kj Harris and West voting yea; Olsen voting nay.

City Attorney – State Licensing Update

Mayor Williams confirmed everyone received a communication from City Attorney Bradford, as there seems to be some concern from the Council about his reciprocal licensing for Alaska. He stated his only concern is that the application be in with the Alaska Bar and then if it isn't, he needs to get it there. He said there may need to be a time frame in which it should be accomplished.

Councilmember Jason Harris said he talked to the attorney a couple of days ago after Mr. Bradford noticed it was on the agenda. Mr. Harris noted he is in Missouri working on getting references, but he is finding it difficult to go back and get them because he was

self-employed for so many years. Mr. Harris said he questioned him heavily on some other issues and concerns that had been expressed to him from different councilmembers, and Mr. Bradford requested at the next Council meeting where he will be here and able to answer questions, that the Council may want to have an executive session. He stated Mr. Bradford is supposed to contact him once he gets back to town to sit down and discuss some administrative issues.

Councilmember Sivertsen pointed out Mr. Bradford is coming up on his first year of employment and there are some things in his job description that should be addressed. He felt having an evaluation and discussion with him in executive session about what the Council needs would be pertinent.

Mayor Williams asked if the first meeting in June would work, and no objections were heard.

Councilmember Coose requested a copy of the position description be provided well before the packet so councilmembers would have time to review it.

Ordinance No. 10-1650 – Exempting the Sale or Trade of the Nortel DMS100 Switch and Related Equipment in Whole or in Part from Competitive Bid Requirements – First Reading

Copies of Ordinance No. 10-1650 were available for all persons present.

Moved by KJ Harris, seconded by Shay pursuant to Section 3.12.070(e) of the Ketchikan Municipal Code, the City Council adopt non-emergency Ordinance No. 10-1650 to exempt the sale of the Telecommunications Division's surplus Nortel DMS100 switch and related equipment from Section 3.12.070 of the KMC and authorize the general manager to donate, trade, sell or dispose of said switch in whole or in part, in such a manner as he determines reasonable and appropriate with or without competitive bidding.

Motion passed with KJ Harris, Coose, Sivertsen, West, Shay, Olsen and Jason Harris voting yea.

VOUCHERS

Moved by West, seconded by Sivertsen for approval of vouchers to Ketchikan Daily News in the amount of \$4,920.21.

Motion passed with West, Olsen, Jason Harris, KJ Harris, Sivertsen and Coose voting yea; Shay voting nay.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Ketchikan Police Department Award of CALEA Agency support Fund Grant

In his report, Assistant Manager Martin informed the Ketchikan Police Department has been awarded a grant in the amount of \$10,400 from CALEA, which will pay the agency's initial costs associated with becoming nationally accredited. He noted the process to achieve accreditation is expected to take approximately three years to complete.

Request for Loading Zone – Tongass Trading Company, Inside Passage

Assistant Manager Martin reported it was staff's intent to grant a loading zone request submitted by Tongass Trading Company to reactivate a loading zone on Front Street at the intersection of Mission in front of the Ingersol Building/Inside Passage. He noted the intent is to also use the space for a stop in the City center for cruise passenger shuttle operations. Mr. Martin stated intensification of pick up and drop off this year is expected to increase due to the addition of private and Borough passengers shuttles to the downtown area.

Councilmember Sivertsen said he had a problem removing public parking for private shuttles, plus he knows the Planning Department is working on a parking and striping operation as well. He said he would like to see this item referred to the Planning Department or for the Council to deny it.

Mayor Williams said he didn't want to see it referred to the Planning Department because they do not work for the City. He said the downtown plan that is being developed will need to be provided to the Council, then the Council will have to decide what to do on the streets. He wanted to make sure everyone who is working on the streets, including tour companies and bus guys, have a chance to look at it, which will be a long process. He stated he knew this would be the year of the shuttle, and hopefully the plan will get to them but he didn't see it happening in the near future.

Moved by Sivertsen, seconded by Kj Harris to deny the request of Tongass Trading Company to reactivate a loading zone on Front Street at the intersection of Mission in front of the Ingersol Building/Inside Passage.

Motion passed with Sivertsen, Kj Harris, Olsen and Shay voting yea; Jason Harris, Coose and West voting nay.

Ketchikan Police Department Patrol Position Hiring Update

Assistant Manager Martin provided a memorandum from Police Chief Talik informing staff is in the final stages of hiring a candidate for the position of patrol officer.

Use of the Third Avenue Bypass by Tour Vehicles

Manager Amylon informed pursuant to Ordinance No. 05-1515 he intends to authorize tour vehicles to utilize the Third Avenue extension for the duration of the 2010 construction season.

Gateway Center for Human Services

Manager Amylon stated the transfer to Akeela of Gateway had taken place, and the computer connections were severed today so they are on their own.

State Capitol Budget

Manager Amylon said he talked with the City's state lobbyist this week, and it is his best estimate that the capitol budget will be transmitted to the governor sometime next week. He said the state lobbyist's understanding is the governor has 20 working days to make veto decision, and he will keep the Council posted.

Firefighter Union Discussions

Manager Amylon reported he and Fire Chief Hill have been in discussion with the firefighters regarding a memorandum of agreement dealing with a shift change, which allows them to work 48 hours on and 96 hours off. He said it can be terminated at any time if it doesn't work out, but they feel it will be in the best interests of the City in reducing overtime. In response to Mayor Williams, he said he can report back to the Council within a month as to its effectiveness.

Special Meeting – Library Site Selection

Manager Amylon reminded there is a special meeting next week on Thursday regarding the Library site selection.

Site Work at Jefferson Street and Third Avenue

Manager Amylon reported there is work being done at the intersection of Third Avenue and Jefferson Street. He said that work is being done under the auspices of the Borough through a negotiated agreement with the City. He noted it was done under your predecessor's tenure but it is to improve the site visibility at that intersection. He said the city will share in the cost at 50%, not to exceed \$15,000 and he felt it was well worth it.

City Lobbying Trip to Washington DC

Manager Amylon felt the trip last week was a productive series of meetings with the delegation in terms of the hospital. He suspected it will be awhile before we know if anything comes of them.

K.P.U. MANAGER'S REPORT

**Electric Division Journeyman Lineman Job Acceptance
Withdrawn**

Assistant Manager Martin notified the Council that Mr. Bodie Leaf of Thompson Falls, Montana has withdrawn his acceptance of the position of Journeyman Lineman with KPU. He noted staff will continue to search to fill the position.

**Report of Electric Outages Occurring April 11 and April
17, 2010**

Assistant Manager Martin provided a report from Electric Division Manager Kline updating the Council on two separate electrical outages.

Report of Reservoir Elevations

Manager Amylon provided a report from Electric Division Manager Kline regarding the reservoir elevations. Mr. Kline noted the reservoirs are not far off the ten-year average elevations, but there are concerns with below normal run-off and a continued dry weather pattern.

May 5, 2010 Power Outages

Manager Amylon copied the Council with a memorandum from Electric Division Manager Kline regarding the May 5, 2010 power outages. He said KPU is working with SEAPA to try to minimize the potential for that happening again.

The Council took a short break at 8:05 p.m. and reconvened at 8:10 p.m.

MAYOR AND COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Sivertsen said there will be an important vote coming on the library site, and the Council needs to pick one. He stated there is not an ideal one out there, but we need to pick from what we have.

Councilmember Coose said the Council needed to choose a smart site for the library, even though the councilmembers all have their opinions about things. He continued that Washington DC was a good trip and they met with a number of people, including: Kim

Elton who may be able to help us with two mines in the Ketchikan area; the Undersecretary of Agriculture in charge of the Forest Service for the purposes of more timber on the Tongass; Senator Murkowski about the hospital and a number of other things; Senator Begich who will have an open meeting tomorrow night so anyone interested should go; and Don Young. He felt the people they met with will help us with what they can; they are on our side.

Councilmember Shay said there was a successful trash pickup a couple of weeks ago, and he represented the Mayor at a barbecue that followed. He stated there were a reported 600 kids from the high school who picked up 5,200+ of trash. He noted the organizer, Scott Isaacs, is very passionate about garbage clean up.

He informed he is headed to the Alaska Municipal League Board of Directors meeting in Anchorage tomorrow, who is paying for virtually most of it. He explained at that time they will be considering future conferences for the organization. He reminded there was one two years ago in Ketchikan and he wondered if there was any interest in getting in the queue in another two or three years, because it is a great economic boon at a time of the year when our travel industry could use the money. He stated they would also be considering the ballot initiative referred to as the "Gag Law," or the anti-corruption law, which is highly misleading. He referred to a memorandum from the Borough Planning Department talking about the formula related to parking for the new library, and there will need to be upward of 20 spaces needed. He wondered about the lake level reports, and questioned whether we should also include lake levels from Tyee and all the rest of the lakes, or possibly no reports at all unless we are in trouble. Mr. Shay reported the City hosted a transit forum, discussing all the projects that are being done. He stated he was very impressed with City staff and they did a good job on it, and the public took it well. He noted great information was available at the meeting.

Councilmember Olsen stated the Library Feasibility Committee will be meeting on Sunday at 4:00 p.m. at the Ted Ferry Civic Center. He said it was his understanding that Borough Planning got an invitation to attend. Clerk Suiter informed it is being publicly advertised.

Councilmember West said Senator Begich will be here tomorrow night meeting with people and it is also the Celebration of the Sea Art Walk. She thanked Jacob Schwartz for his work behind the scenes performing videography work for CommVision. She said he stood at the Library Feasibility Committee meeting for three hours and taped the whole thing. She realized he does this a lot, nights and weekends, and is probably an unsung employee so she wanted to thank him and express appreciation for his hard work.

Mayor Williams spoke about the trip to Washington DC, stating they met with the different representatives. He noted they met with the Rural Development guys and it wasn't the greatest meeting. He said when we first got into this project and worked together with KIC, we were told there was money available to go towards our project and were encouraged to get involved to present something as a joint venture. He explained

the week before we went down KIC was informed they should apply for \$15.7 million, and when we sit at the table with them they tell us they don't give out that kind of money but they may be able to give us \$500,000 in a grant or a loan. He felt they shot us down in a hurry. He reported we quickly went back to Murkowski and Begich, and they are looking into it. He hoped they could help us out, and we will keep pushing for the hospital.

Mayor Williams continued by discussing taxicabs, and he hoped there was some way we could see what the demand is during the summer, to determine if there actually are waiting times. Manager Amylon said he would discuss the issue with Chief Talik. Mayor Williams continued this weekend is very busy, citing the Art Walk, the Library meeting, a wine tasting, baseball, soccer, ballet, Begich and graduation up at the college. He encouraged everyone to pick and choose and enjoy.
